Earth Works

Summer 1 is a very short half term, but we are cramming a lot of learning into it! Our topic on Roman Britain has got off to a flying start with work in our Creative Curriculum and English, and we have been exploring the wonderful world of plants in Science. Read on for an update on our learning over the last few weeks.

The beautifully illustrated book, *Escape from Pompeii*, has been the focus of our writing in our unit on historical stories. We have written descriptive settings, practised our speech punctuation and created lively retellings of the characters' desperate attempt to flee the city of Pompeii as Mount Vesuvius erupts! Here are some extracts from our exciting writing:

The children held onto each other as the ground shook like a herd of wild beast passing. They were frozen to the spot.

The not-so-gentle Mount Vesuvius erupted like one thousand fireflies swarming together.


The volcano erupted with flowing lava spilling down the side. Pompeii was going down in flames.

There was a long terrible moment when the hot burning lava destroyed their sweet precious village.

Tears rolled down their cheeks as they looked back at the lava destroying their beloved city. Suddenly Mount Vesuvius exploded in a scream. Pompeii was destroyed.

As they looked back, Mount Vesuvius had turned into a horror and destroyed the city. Their beloved Pompeii was devastated. The volcano had destroyed the city it was protecting. It had killed its love.





In Science, we have been investigating plants: discovering which plants are growing in the school grounds and how and why they differ in different areas; finding out about plant families; naming plant parts; exploring what plants need to grow and conducting a variety of investigations. We have been growing beans in the classroom to discover the stages of development of a plant from seed to flower. The children have enjoyed observing their beans and have been surprised by the speed of their growth - although some have grown more quickly than others...



In Art, we have been exploring sculpture. Inspired by Antony Gormley's Field for the British Isles, we designed and sculpted clay figures to create our own Ellingham Field. Some of the figures represented particular emotions; others were based on people we knew. Once the clay has dried and hardened, we will group our figures together to create our own installation.

Here are a few of the other things we have been doing recently in class:

- Calculating with money, including decimal notation.
- Learning vocabulary about places in town in French.
- Exploring life as a Roman Legionary and the building of Hadrian's Wall.

Coming Up...

- Discussion texts and a debate in English.
- Statistics in Maths. We will be interpreting data in graphs and charts, solving problems and creating our own graphs from data.

Helping at Home
